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All Work and Not Enough Play

Work and Life

For many workers balancing work and life is easier said than done. Farmers are no different: Those long hours, especially during certain days, weeks, or seasons, makes it difficult to have more time for life and less time for work. As such, farmers have an imbalance between work and life, and the scale, unfortunately, is tipped towards work.

Work and Family

But, what about farmers' balance between work and family? In Ohio, families own 99% of farms (USDA), which usually means that family members help with the work. One farmer shared that Sunday was family day on her farm: All family members reported for work on Sunday afternoon. I'm not sure how it is for other farm families, yet I think that farmers have an imbalance between work and family. On the one hand, the imbalance between work and family seems to favor time with family. On the other hand, if family time is mostly work and very little, if any, play, then that might illustrate an imbalance in another area.

Work and Play

Farmers spend much time with their families, but farmers must try to achieve some balance between work and play. Work is important, but so is play. Child development scientists, for a long time, have documented the important role of play in children's development. When adults, for example parents, spend time in unstructured pretend and physical play with their children, those children may develop positive relationships with these adults. Also, unstructured play helps children develop creativity, memory, motor skills, cognitive flexibility, emotion regulation, regulation of emotions.

Data from recent studies suggest that adults who play—do activities that they enjoy—have reduced stress and a greater sense of well-being (see e.g., Proyer, 2013). Adult play, which is more than merely goofing off, has many forms, but some common characteristics. For example, adult play engages your mind; is pleasurable; and the process, or doing, is more important than the product.

When you take some time for adult play, do activities that you enjoy. When play time is with your children and family members, you could ask what they might like to do. You may not be used to playing, but hopefully the experiences will reward your efforts and encourage your persistence.

HAMMERHEAD HYSTERIA

What - Hammerheads in Ohio?!

No, we are not talking about hammerhead sharks. What we are referring to are the hammerhead flatworms that have been re-discovered in Ohio this year. It sounds like something from a horror movie, but hammerhead flatworms are real and might be in your backyard if your backyard contains prime habitat and plenty of invertebrate snacks such as earthworms. Should you worry about them? Probably not.

From a distance these flatworms look just like any other worm, but a closer examination will show a broadened head that gives them their name. Unlike earthworms that eat plant debris in the soil, hammerhead flatworms eat other invertebrates like snails, slugs, and earthworms. Some species of hammerhead flatworm have a very pronounced hammer-shaped head, but the species we are finding here in Ohio, the Wandering Broadhead Planarian (Bipalium adventitium) and Three-Lined Land Planarian (Bipalium pennsylvanicum), have heads that look slightly flattened. Another distinguishing feature of these flatworms are the black lines running down their back. From the pictures you can see the single line of the Bipalium adventitium and the multiple lines of the Bipalium pennsylvanicum.

Hammerhead flatworms consume their prey by secreting a toxin in their mucous that dissolves their food so they can consume it in liquid form. Gross right? Well, this is where much of the hysteria surrounding these worms comes into play. That toxin they secrete has been known to give some people skin irritation if they are sensitive to it, so it is best to handle these worms with gloves.

There are similarities in their toxin to that of the pufferfish, a tetrodotoxin, but there is little known about how this toxin affects the environment where hammerhead worms are found. Unless consumed in large quantities, there is likely little to be concerned about with your family and pets.

We mentioned that these species have been re-discovered-this is because hammerhead flatworms have been present in Ohio since at least 2004, but anecdotal encounters go back to the 1980's. These invasive flatworms have been here for many years, but they have gained more attention recently. If you do encounter one, you can carefully kill it with salt, rubbing alcohol, or vinegar applied directly to the flatworm. Use these methods carefully as they are more likely to damage your plants than the flatworm itself. There no products or home remedies that you can apply to your entire yard to kill them all that won't kill everything else, so our advice is to not worry about them until you see one. When that happens, then take action with the aforementioned methods and report sightings through the Great Lakes Early Detection Network App,





Every 4-H family with a market project will receive a DUNF link one week prior to the start of the Jefferson County Fair to the email address provided in 4H online. If you need to make changes to this email address, you can call Christina Haught at 740-264-2212, before August 5. The DUNF can be completed at the exhibitor's convenience anytime after the link is received but before 11:59pm, August 15! After the link is received, you are encouraged to call our office at 740-264-2212 with any questions, or to stop by the office from 8am-4pm, Monday-Friday if you need assistance. The OSU Extension will be available with ipads to assist those who could not complete the DUNF at home or ahead of time from 10 am - 2 pm, Aug 15 in the livestock arena. Failure to complete a DUNF for each market animal (or a pen of animals depending on species as the instructions dictate) will result in not being able to sell at the livestock sale and forfeiture of any and all prizes associated with the animal. Change is always difficult, but we can do this!



If you are noted to be state fair eligible, we need to know by Wednesday July 20, if you are attending. If you are an alternate for state fair, please be prepared you may be offered the opportunity to compete. If you are going to be offered this opportunity it will be by a phone call in July 21.

Buyer's Letters and Sale Order

It is time for youth members to be sending out those buyer's letters. In the letter, please include the following at a minimum:

- A photo of you and your project animal.
- Some information about your why you love your project and any other 4-H activities in which you participate.
- The livestock sale date which is starting at noon, Saturday, August 20!
- The Livestock sale order: goats, lambs, hogs, feeders, steers, poultry, rabbits.
- There will be a buyer's picnic again in 2022.
- Include that registration for new and returning buyers will happen before the sale. Remind buyers to please arrive early to register. They can walk through the barns to evaluate the animals and to potentially meet the youth members with livestock for sale.
- Also, remind buyers that by supporting local youth livestock projects they are acquiring fresh, homegrown meat. This may be less expensive, but is most often better quality than what is purchased at the local supermarket.
- Purchases can be tax-deductible. If buyers are not interested in processing an animal, they can purchase an animal to support local youth and never even take the meat back home. Animals can be sent to the Carrollton Livestock Auction and the donation to the youth can be recorded as a donation/tax-deduction.

Horse Groom-N-Clean Attention Club Advisors!

The Jefferson County 4-H Horse Groom and Clean Competition is scheduled for **Saturday August 13th, 2022** at The Jefferson County Fairgrounds. Teams will start mudding their horses at 10am between barn 1 and 2. Inspection and a written test will begin at 1:30pm. Grooming will begin at 2pm. This will be followed by showmanship.

Teams are made up of 3 Junior members, ages 9-13 4-H years, or 3 Senior members, ages 14-18 4-H years. The 4-H members must be currently enrolled in a 4-H horse project, and one adult horse handler must accompany each group. Horses must be 13.2 hands or taller.

Teams may use a member from another club if you needed to fill a team. A junior can be used on a senior team but you cannot use a senior on a junior team.

Reminder, all team members MUST WEAR boots or heavy leather shoes and long pants.
