

HOPE REBELS UNITE-

Let's Combat the Unhappiness Epidemic with 4-H!


It's that time of year again when we all recharge with friends and family at many different holiday gatherings. We take a pause from the busy 4-H world to re-evaluate last year's personal goals and set new learning initiatives. This revamping activity happens on many levels.

- It happens as a parent or 4-H older youth- Reviewing project ideas, planning livestock or companion animal purchases, or determining activities for the upcoming 4-H year.
- It happens as a 4-H volunteer Which 4-H activities can you make time to assist in implementing? There are so many activities in our county that require a ton of volunteers.
- As a club head advisor Are you planning an educational day trip, trying to grow your club membership, or learning more about state 4-H opportunities.

The holiday break is the perfect time to be intentional about planning 4-H goals, before the new year becomes overwhelming.

During my recharging and re-evaluation period this fall, I encountered a very special presenter named Chris Rehs-Dupin. His presentation energized my planning, and I hope I can now pay-it-forward and inspire our county 4-H advisors, volunteers, parents and older youth.

Did you know there is a global rise in unhappiness. Legit. Studies show that the downward spiral of positivity since Covid just scratches the surface of a global problem. A Gallup blog posted on Sept. 22, 2022, shows that anger stress, physical pain and worry have reached a new high. Poll results found that from Jan. 1, 2006 – Jan. 1, 2021, the entire world's negative experience index rose drastically. Who even knew there was an index for this?!



The study goes on to show that globally the gap of "wellbeing inequality" has grown significantly. This is the measure of people who are satisfied with life versus those who are not satisfied with life. The study is not income based, but rather a measure of overall wellbeing.

So how does this affect our 4-H program?

It brings to light why the overall POSITIVE ATTITUDE of advisors, volunteers, parents and older 4-H youth is the most valuable gift you can bestow on Jefferson County 4-H program and the people around you! YES, YOU SIMPLY ARMED WITH POSTIVITY is so unbelievably important right now! Today's youth are surrounded by unhappiness and wellbeing inequality! From social media to school classrooms, difficult home situations to baseball field throw downs, our youth are bombarded with negativity. Did you know that the Ohio High School Athletic Association just introduced a new "Respect The Game" program to address bad fan behavior! What kind of world is this for my children, your children, our grandchildren?



Today I am asking you all, every advisor, volunteer, parent and older 4-H youth to be what speaker Chris Rehs-Dupin tagged as a <u>HOPE REBEL!</u> You are in a role of authority, because at some point you agreed to provide all the youth in your charge with the gift of a positive, nurturing, environment to learn and grow! At that time, you were called to be better, to do better than those surveyed for the unhappiness chart! Being a Hope Rebel is what being a 4-H Advisor, 4-H Volunteer, 4-H Parent, or older 4-H youth is at its core. By being a 4-H leader you agreed to choose kindness over fear and anger; and to share joy instead of rumors and misinformation. When people look to you, they should know that there is hope, fairness, kindness and positivity on which they can lean!

So how do we do this? How do we provide this type of inclusive, nurturing environment, when we are surrounded with so much unhappiness? There are scientific studies that outline the factors that attribute to a feeling of wellbeing. Here are just some of the factors that you as a parent, volunteer, advisor and 4-H teen can personally impact.



Make sure your youth have a network of close friends — this is why club membership and club dynamics are so important. Are your club members doing enough activities together that they feel like a cohesive group? Are people being unheard or left out? Are your club members helping each other learn? Are your club meetings a safe space for everyone? Club members should have a positive sense of competition, but not an overwhelming toxic sense "winning."

Be intentional about encouraging healthy self-esteem in your club meetings. 4-H should be a self-esteem building opportunity. It is the job of an advisor to provide within the club "little wins." Are you providing opportunities in your club activities for youth members grow, learn and be successful at something, at anything?? This is the root of self-esteem. Being able to do something, anything provokes a feeling of pride.



Encourage an optimistic outlook amongst your club members. Let's be excited about the iron chef competition and community service. These activities should not be a drudgery. Be engaged and be happy about club meetings and activities. Positivity should start at the top and funnel downward through all the parents, youth and volunteers.



Help your members set realistic and achievable goals. Make the topic of your first meeting "goal-setting." As a first-year rabbit showman it is great to want to place as grand champion, however, the goal should be to place in the top 20 in showmanship. Let's help our youth to set short term, medium-term and long-term goals, so that they feel accomplished each year. (This goes back to self-esteem.) Little wins add up to big success.



Create a sense of purpose and meaning. Nobody wants to be a part of something that does nothing. Make sure each youth member, volunteer and parent has a job. Everyone should be participating on a committee in their club. Who is in charge of the booth? Who is coaching an iron chef team? Who is responsible to coordinate demonstration speeches? This communication

Create a sense of belonging. Everyone belongs here. In 4-H, in the club, at the event, on the team and at the fair. Everyone deserves to feel valued and deserves to be seen. So, softly encourage others to do better if they are falling short in the kindness department. No youth member should endure hearing a parent trash talk them as they leave the ring at the county fair. The latest rumors or animal-based drama is not appropriate conversation for a 4-H meeting. Our youth repeat and act out what they are hearing, seeing and being taught at home, and in the camper, Adult gossipy behavior directly impacts all youth members' inability to create lasting friendships, feel as if they belong, and their ability to gain self-esteem. So as an advisor, parent, older youth or volunteer, make a concerted effort to be kind, include, and above all else value your club members. Problem situations will arise but remember to make your best attempt to handle with care the youth members and families in your charge.

Help your youth members grow the ability to adapt to change. Help the youth whose steer died unexpectedly, maybe he needs to focus on a still project for the remainder of the year. Encourage that 4-H youth who is learning pet rabbit information, but really would rather have a horse. Throw club members into learning activities that they are not necessarily prepared for, so that they think on their feet. As adults we know that sometimes one must "roll with the punches." It is important for youth (and other advisors or parents) to learn to refocus and bounce back. As a side note: keep in mind what causes anger. Anger is caused by anxiety, fear, loss of control, feelings of inadequacy and embarrassment. When evaluating any situation with an angry youth or adult, consider the source of the anger. This can help you help that unhappy individual adapt to the new, perhaps less agreeable situation.



Help your members participate in a democratic society. Are you allowing youth members to learn how meetings are run and how to participate? Are you teaching Robert's Rules Of Order? Are you providing civic opportunities? We are happier and more productive when we are contributing to our governance. Don't run your meeting like a totalitarian state.



Finally, encourage regular exercise, encourage balanced nutrition, encourage enough sleep.

None of us are perfect, but as part of the 4-H family we have a responsibility to be HOPE REBELS. Our youth members need us to demonstrate a positive attitude and provide an environment that nurtures wellbeing. Let's tackle wellbeing inequality one action at a time. Here. Now.. Everyday... In our families... In our clubs... In our communities. It literally starts with a smile and an authentic desire to help our youth learn and grow into engaged, healthy, educated and able adults.

Be intentional in the upcoming 4-H year to design memorable, educational and healthy experiences. Our 4-H youth are counting on you to help them find HOPE in an increasingly unhappy world. It takes a village, now more than ever.



It is one of two agreements signed by families each year before participating in 4-H and Jefferson County Fair events. The other is the Jefferson County Fair Code of Conduct.

Please read through this 4-H Code of Conduct and internalize its meaning. This agreement is an integral part of the 4-H program and 4-H sign-up activities each year.

This most recent update from the state office reminds us... No matter if it is on social media or in person, while speaking to the person running the gate, with the fair veterinarian, a 4-H'er or a species judge, let's continue to "Make The Best Better," in words and actions.

OHIO 4-H CODE OF CONDUCT

4-H members, parents, and other adults participating in 4-H activities will:

- Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies, and rules of the facility being used.
- Conduct themselves in a courteous, ethical, respectful manner, use appropriate language (including not using profanity), exhibit good sportsmanship, and provide positive role models.
- Abstain from illegal behaviors, use of alcohol, illegal or illicit drugs, tobacco in any form, and/or any vaping products during 4-H events and activities.
- 4. Fully participate in scheduled activities.
- 5. Respect other's property and privacy rights.
- Abstain from child abuse (physical and/or verbal) harassment, and actions that bully, ridicule, dominate, or display inappropriate behavior toward others.
- Accept personal responsibility for behavior, destruction or theft of property including any financial damage.
- 8. Be responsible for any financial damage caused by inappropriate behavior.
- 9. Adhere to rules of safety.
- Follow Ohio and county laws and regulations related to the care, handling, and possession of animals and living creatures.
- Operate machinery, vehicles, and any other required equipment in a responsible manner in accordance with the directives of OSU Extension personnel and Ohio and county laws and regulations.
- 12. I will uphold and support the responsible and lawful use of social media. In so doing, I will not create or post social media content that is abusive, threatening, defamatory, obscene, harassing, or creates a hostile environment.
- Follow the Ohio State University Standards of Behavior for Minor Participants
 Participating in Activities and Programs with Minor Participants.

As a program participant in OSU Extension, 4-H participants must practice good citizenship, leadership and self-control and not engage in discriminatory behavior, which includes harassment, discrimination, sexual misconduct, and retaliation.

This means you should not exclude anyone from participating in any program or activity, or discriminate against them because of their identity.

Identity includes: age, ancestry, color, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity or expression, genetic information, HIV/AIDS status, military status, national origin, pregnancy, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or protected veteran status.

A full definition of harassment and discrimination can be found in the Affirmative Action, Equal Employment Opportunity, and Non-Harassment/Discrimination policy.

Consequences for violating any part of this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to: removal from the 4-H program; removal from participation in the event in which the code of conduct has been violated (at the individual's expense); forfeiture of financial support; sanctions on or being banned from participating in future 4-H events; removal from leadership positions and/or offices held, etc. When warranted (e.g., violation of law) the situation may be turned over to the appropriate law enforcement authority.

This guide will help you enroll for the first time in Ohio 4-H.


Step 1: Visit: oh.4honline.com

- Mozilla Firefox and Google Chrome are the recommended browsers. Please do not use Internet Explorer.
- Select the option "Don't have an account?"
- Select Ohio as your state and then "Ohio 4-H Youth Development"
- · Select your county from the drop-down menu.
- Enter an email address, phone number and create a password
 - Note: The email address that you use will be used by all members of your family to log into 4-HOntline in the future.
- Enter your address, city, state and postal code.



Step 2: Build Your Member Profile

 Begin building the first member's profile by choosing "add new member" and selecting "4-H" as the program you would like to join.




Select "Next" and continue through the rest of the questions, entering all of the required member information including name and birthdate. Select the option "I want to join 4-H as a new or returning member." Then select "Finish".



Step 3: Select Your Club(s)

- Select your 4-H Club(s) for this year by choosing the "Select Club" button.
- Verify that the county is correct at the top of the pop-up window and select the club(s) by selecting "Add" next to the club name.



Step 4: Select Your Project(s) Select your 4-H projects(s) for this year by choosing the "Select Projects" button. Then select the projects from the list by clicking the "Add" button next to the project name.





- Select all of the projects for this year <u>before</u> submitting your enrollment. If you
 need to make changes to your projects after submitting your enrollment, you will
 have to contact the Extension office to request a change.
- If you are enrolling in projects for more than one club, you will want to verify that
 you have selected the correct club at the top of the project pop-up window.
- If you select a horse project, a shooting sports project, or a dog project, you will be automatically prompted to electronically sign the appropriate project consents for those projects. Type your names in the boxes to affirm your agreement.
- Cloverbud members should select project number 710, Cloverbud Activities.

Step 5: Continue Enrollment Questions

Select the "Show Questions" button and complete the additional "About You" questions. Complete all of the required fields as indicated and click Next.



Step 6: Review and Sign Consent Forms

 Affirm that you agree to the Code of Conduct, the General Permission statement, and the Photo Release. Both the member and a parent/guardian names should be typed into the boxes and click on the agreement buttons.

Step 7: Review Enrollment

- Review your enrollment and select submit.
 - Remember, do not hit submit until you are sure that you have selected all of your projects for this year.







PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The 4-H Camp Counselors are a group of 4-H teens selected to assist in being responsible for campers ages 9-13, during 4-H camp. As a result of participation, counselors will develop knowledge, skills, attitudes and aspirations needed for adult success, and the Jefferson County 4-H program will be strengthened and expanded. Roles and Responsibilities of 4-H Camp Counselors include:

- Attend required trainings prior to camp.
- Market and promote camp.
- Serve in a leadership and teaching role to other counselors.
- Serve on committees or other groups to plan programs at camp.
- Conduct self in an appropriate manner before, during, and after camp while serving as a role model to campers and peers.
- Assist staff and other counselors with camp activities; work as a team to implement the activities.
- Know and understand all safety guidelines, including emergency procedures, associated with the camp and program areas.
- Follow and enforce camp rules.
- Assure for safety of campers at all times including in cabins, sessions, and large group activities.
- Be aware of child protection regulations and report any child abuse, sexual abuse, or neglect in accordance with university policy.
- Identify and respond to camper behavior issues.
- Ensure campers' health and hygiene, e.g., brushing teeth, eating meals, taking medication, etc.
- Promote camper participation during camp.
- Lead and supervise campers in activities at camp including but not fimited to songs, teambuilding challenges, group activities, challenges, etc.
- Teach and lead campers at workshops or during other components at camp (table setting, song leading, etc.)
- . Mentor and give guidance to campers to encourage positive youth development and enhancement of life skills.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Must be at least 14 years old by Jan. 1, and be a member in good standing for the last 2 years.
- Must be able to get transportation to meetings and events as needed.
- Must complete a minimum of 12 hours of training in person, with at least 4 hours being on site at Elkhorn Valley.
- Must complete Child Abuse Awareness training.
- Must Sign Standards of Behaviors, complete the Code of Conduct form, and have a current Ohio 4-H Health History form on file.
- First time applicants must provide two references.
- If the individual is 18+ year old at least two months prior to camp, the individual must have their background check conducted before the start of camp.

SELECTION PROCESS

 Individuals who complete the application and fulfill application requirements will be contacted regarding the selection process.

MEETING DATES/TIME/FREQUENCY/TRAINING

4-H Camp Counselors meet the following dates throughout the year, with the first training date being on Presidents Day. Counselors are expected to notify the Extension Office if an absence is unavoidable.4-H Camp Counselors will be trained on topics such as the camp counselor core competencies; risk management, including active shooter guidelines, emergency protocols, and child abuse recognition.

Youth Activities and Programs Policy Office of Institutional Equity Standards of Behavior for Employees/Volunteers

Standards of Behavior for Employees and Volunteers Working in Youth Activities and Programs

This Standards of Behavior is an agreement accepted by employees/volunteers who work in a youth activity or program. The primary purpose of these standards is to promote the safety and wellbeing of all activity/program participants. Employees/volunteers are expected to function within these standards.

I will:

- Accept supervision and support from professional staff while involved in the activity/program
- Accept the responsibility to professionally represent the activity/program and The Ohio State University.
- Conduct myself in a courteous and respectful manner, exhibit good sportsmanship and be a positive role model for youth.
- Respect, adhere to and enforce the rules, policies and guidelines established by the activity or program and the
 university.
- Refrain from engaging in any criminal conduct.
- Comply with all applicable civil rights laws and policies, including and not limited to Ohio State equal opportunity and nondiscrimination policies.
- Perform duties in a responsible and timely manner as outlined in the position description.
- Report any child abuse or neglect in accordance with university policy.
- Self-disclose felony or misdemeanor convictions that occur within three days of pleading guilty or being convicted.
 - If I have been background checked and have had a break of service for less than 12 months, I will
 disclose any convictions that occurred during the break within three business days of commencement of
 participation in youth activities and programs. If the break in service is longer than 12 months, I must be
 background checked again.
- Not intentionally or purposefully place myself in a situation where I am alone with a youth unless authorized by the
 dean/vice president (or designee). Approved one-on-one interactions may only take place in open, wellilluminated spaces or rooms observable by other adults from the activity or program. If the dean/vice president
 (or designee) determines that meeting in this manner is not practicable and approves other arrangements, an
 exemption request form must be submitted following the exemption process outlined in the policy.
- Not, under any circumstances, physically, sexually, verbally, or emotionally abuse or fail to provide the basic necessities of care applicable to the activity/program, such as food or shelter, to participants.
- Endeavor to provide a safe and healthy experience for all participants.
- Report red-flag behaviors to the activity or program administrator of the youth activity or program that I am
 working or volunteering in. If I am an activity or program administrator, I will review red flag behaviors and work
 with those working and volunteering in my activity or program to correct these behaviors.
- Read and uphold the <u>Youth Privacy Principles</u> located at go.osu.edu/youthprivacy

I have read and understand the standards of behavior outlined above. I understand and agree that any act or omission on my part that contradicts any portion of these standards may be grounds for immediate suspension and/or termination of my employee/volunteer status with The Ohio State University.

I understand and agree that I will be asked to call my parents/guardian immediately to pick me up if I conduct myself in an irresponsible manner, which includes being out of my cabin after hours and/or the possession or use of tobacco, alcohol, illegal drugs or fireworks.

I will be expected to:

- ✓ Attend the required number of counselor training sessions. I understand I will be dismissed if I am not able to complete the required training.
- ✓ Abide by the No Cell Phones at Camp Policy (note: unless otherwise authorized by Extension staff)
- ✓ Treat other peers with respect.
- ✓ Not bully fellow counselors or participate in roughhousing, horse-play, or hazing.
- Conduct myself as a positive role model and be responsible.
- ✓ Set a good example by not using profanity or telling off-color jokes, and stories.
- ✓ As a 4-H member, not have in my possession tobacco, alcohol or illegal drugs.
- ✓ Not have possession of harmful objects without specific authorization from the camp director, including but not limited to: knives of any kind (pocket, utility, etc.), lighters, matches, fireworks, explosives, firearms, weapons, etc.
- ✓ No pornography or other sexually oriented materials including nudity in visual or written materials including similar content.
- ✓ Be a responsible cabin counselor and ensure campers are provided guidance towards a safe and fun week
- ✓ Ensure that all campers are supervised by counselor staff at all times. Be sure that all campers know that they must remain on the camp grounds at all times and are responsible for their behavior at all times
 - 6 Get to know each of the campers personally and by name.
 - o Have all campers, including myself check in any of their medications with the nurse.
 - Make sure each camper uses personal hygiene.
 - Make sure that all of my campers are familiar with camp facilities and camp rules
 - See that all campers are involved in all activities. Make sure no one is excluded.
- ✓ Check for illness or injury, but don't make much of a "fuss" about minor things. Go with hurt or sick campers to the nurse no matter how minor the ailment.
- ✓ Follow guidelines for lights out, and cabin supervision. Be in my cabin with my campers at all times between the hours of "Lights Out" and "Rise and Shine."
- ✓ Never discipline a camper by ridicule or physical punishment; patience and understanding works best.
- ✓ Urge safety at all time. Take time to explain how and why to do something safely.
- ✓ Work as a team to plan, organize and conduct all camp activities.
- ✓ Be flexible with counseling and adult staff.
- ✓ Participate in camp promotion.
- ✓ Follow leadership of camping program through adult advisors/volunteers/staff.

This is your opportunity to show us your culinary skills. YOUR MENU ITEM: CREAM CHEESE As an added addition to our contest, you must design and bring in an educational placemat with information about the cream cheese you use.

Your recipe will be judged in one of 3 categories:

Appetizer, Main Dish or Dessert. Please list your category on the registration form.

Categories may be divided into sub-categories based on the number of entries.

4-H clubs competing will prepare a dish <u>ahead of time and bring</u> a recipe to serve 2 judges. All dishes will be judged on the attached rubric. You must also bring enough for at least 20 "tastes" for the tasting session following judging. Small paper plates and napkins will be provided to each table. (You may want to bring extra.)

(Cloverbuds and older teams ALL follow the same ingredient and categories for 2024)

ENTRY RULES:



Species Achievement Interviews:

Each participant will be interviewed for 5-7 minutes. Topics will include species knowledge, 4-H activities, and 4-H knowledge. A youth must be enrolled in the 4-H project correlating to the interview. The top three individuals will be placed. Species Achievement Awards will be judged for rabbit, small animal, swine, horse, dog, goat, sheep, poultry, beef, dairy. This interview is part of the Most Outstanding Exhibitor process, but even if a youth is not competing for MOE, youth members can still compete in this category. No achievement form required.

Divisions for Species Interview are:

Rules

- 11. Refer to the Poster Contest Rules in the 2024 Poster Contest, rule information. Posters will be judged on Educational Content (50 pts.), Neatness/Appearance (30 pts.), and Originality (20 pts.). A score sheet can be found at www.osu.edu/osfidoss.
- 12. Poster score sheets are used for judging only and will not be returned to the exhibitor.

Each Spring, a hole, called a tap, is drilled into a maple tree. After a <u>freeze</u>, when temperatures warm up, sap will run out of the tap into a pail or a tube to be collected for making maple syrup. It takes about 40 gallons of sap to make just 1 galloon of syrup.. It takes about 25 years for a tree to be big enough to tap!
