Dear 4-H Horse Participant:

Welcome to your 2023 4-H year! I hope you are excited to learn more about horsemanship, sportsmanship and more this year in 4-H! Enclosed you will find so much information that your head may spin, so I recommend taking the information in small spurts. Here are some items or dates of most importance!

- All Horse Project paperwork must be turned in to the OSU Extension office by 4 pm June 1. This includes the county ID Form, the state ID form, any required photos, any lease information, permission to participate form, etc.
- Jefferson County requires as of 2023 a completed etiquette class and also 2 ride days. The paperwork that includes the signatures for the ride days (enclosed) must be turned in to me, Angie Allison, at your final approved ride day. It will be kept with all of your other horse-related documentation. It is recommended that you take a photo of this ride day paper and all entry papers before turning it over. This protects you and the Extension office. All dates for these events are included in this packet.
- The State 4-H Program requires a new horse quality assurance program called EQUISSteps. This online class must be completed by June 1 each year. Please include a copy of the completion certificate with your county ID Form. The link to access the class is pinned to the top of the county 4-H Facebook Page for ease of use.
- Jefferson County will hold a PAS show at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds on June 10 for those individuals interested in qualifying for the state fair. This will be followed by an open horse show on June 11.
- Horse Camp 2023 "Aloha...Whoa!" will be held June 2-4. Registration information is included.
- Please pay close attention to the Jefferson County Fairbook. It includes information regarding the required showmanship rules, schedules and care of animal rules.

As you know a horse project is a big undertaking. As a youth, you can only be successful with a horse project if an involved adult assists in the learning process. Advisors can do a lot to help, but parents and guardians are an integral part of the process.

Calling all horse project youth/guardians - IMPORTANT CHANGES!!!!

Jefferson County Fairboard and Jefferson County 4-H with other counties around the state are implementing new yearly requirements for every horse project youth. The requirements include:

- 1 Horse riding etiquette class per year. This class will cover ring etiquette and behavior outside of the ring. This 1-hour session will answer questions like: What do I do if the rider behind me is bringing their horse too close to mine? My mom works and I cannot be there in time to feed? What are my responsibilities for taking care of my animal while I am at the fair? Etc. (This is a classroom session only. No horses at the etiquette session.)

- 2 required ride days per year. Every member planning to bring a horse to the fair or qualify for state fair must bring the horse identified on the youth member's horse ID form to the Jefferson County Fairgrounds and complete 2 required ride day events. There are no exceptions to this rule. 7 opportunities are listed below. One day = one ride opportunity. All rides must be checked off in-person on the spread sheet at the event by two of the following people Debbie Grimes, Debbie Hukill, Cindy Stingle, Gail Rine, Erin Ogden or Carl Glenn. (This means two people must be in agreement that the horse and rider are safe to ride in a public place.)

- Completion of the EQUiStep horse quality assurance class per year.

EQUIstep is a self-paced horse quality assurance program like livestock quality assurance. The topics included in EQUIStep will change yearly. However, the only option to complete EQUIStep is online via the link above. If you do not have access to a computer please call 740-264-2212 to schedule a time to visit the OSU Extension office and utilize an office computer. EQUIStep must be completed by June 1. Verification of completion must be turned in with your horse ID, lease forms. (A photo or printed copy of certification which includes date is fine.)

The above requirements must be met to complete a horse project, compete in horse competitions at the Jefferson County Fair and compete at the Ohio State Fair. 4-H horse youth must complete the three items listed above every year. The only horse projects/youth exempt from the above requirements are those which do not require a physical horse such as Horseless Horse, or those members who will not be competing or taking an animal to any fair-related or 4-H Club related events.

Important Horse Dates!

April 15- 7 pm. Mandatory Horse Etiquette/Safety session, Jefferson County Fairgrounds Kitchen - (first option) (This is a classroom session only. No horses at the etiquette session.)

May 24 - 6 pm Horse Ride Day option 1. Also, at 7 pm there will be a make-up class for those who missed the etiquette and safety.

June 2-4 - Horse Camp with in-person horse Skillathon, Jefferson County Fairgrounds. Horse Ride Days Options 2-4 (One ride day can be credited per day of full camp participation. Auditing does not qualify. Official sign off needed at camp to qualify.) Make-up Horse Etiquette Class with time tbd.

June 10 - Horse PAS show (Horse Ride Day option 5)

June 11 - Jefferson County Fairboard Horse Show (Horse Ride Day option 6)

June 28 - Horse Ride Day, Jefferson County Fairgrounds (option 7)
Official check off needed.

No additional make-up days or opportunities will be available, so plan accordingly.

PERMISSION TO PARTICIPATE IN 4-H HORSE ACTIVITIES DISCLOSURE AND RELEASE OF CLAIMS

I, _____, have chosen to participate in the Ohio 4-H Horse Program and its related horse activities. I understand that this participation will involve contact with horses and may give rise to a risk of physical injury.

I am aware that:

- A. Horses have a tendency to behave in ways which may result in injury, death, or loss to riders, or other persons in the immediate vicinity;
- B. Horses may react in an unpredictable way to sounds, sudden movement, unfamiliar objects, persons, or other animals;
- C. Riding a horse may give rise to a risk of injury from hazards arising from the surface or subsurface of the ground in which these riding activities occur;
- D. While in the vicinity of a horse or while riding a horse, I may be involved in a collision with another horse, another animal, a person, or an object;
- E. Other participants in the program may fail to maintain control over a horse or fail to act within their abilities, thus causing harm to me or other participants; and
- F. Other participants in the program may act in a negligent manner, which could result in harm to me.

As parent or guardian I have discussed with my child the need to behave in a safe manner. I will make sure that my child wears appropriate clothing and footwear during horse activities. I further agree that my child shall be subject to the helmet policy.

In consideration for the opportunity to participate in club, county, district and state 4-H horse activities and the use of services and facilities made available through these 4-H horse activities, I do release and forever discharge for myself and my heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, the Ohio 4-H Horse Program professional and volunteer leaders, agents, The Ohio State University and its Board of Trustees, its administrators, faculty and staff, from all claims, demands, and causes of action for personal injury or any other damage which may arise out of or be in any way related to my participation in this activity or program.

I understand that my child is not required to participate in any horse activity, but grant permission for him/her to do so, despite the possible risks. I recognize that by participating in these activities, as with any physical activity, my child may risk personal injury. I hereby attest and verify that I have been advised of the potential risks, that I have full knowledge of the risks involved in these activities, and that I assume any expense that may be incurred in the event of an accident, illness, or other incapacity, regardless of whether I have authorized such expenses. As a parent/guardian, I assume the same risk for myself, and other family members and friends present at these horse activities.

This form needs to be signed and on file for each youth participant in any 4-H horse program activity. The form needs to be signed each year and before a youth participates in the Ohio 4-H Horse Program activities.

Under Ohio law, Section 2305.321 of the Revised Code, an equine activity sponsor, professional, volunteer, participant or other person is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in the equine activities resulting from the inherent risks of equine activities.

Ohio 4-H Equine Mandatory Helmet Use Policy

All youth 19 years and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance.

The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and cautions riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.

The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Judges, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved, defective, or improperly fitted headgear, he/she will not be permitted to participate in riding or driving activities until proper headgear is acquired.



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Jefferson County 4-H and Junior Fair Ride-Day Checklist

This checklist has been adopted to assist with providing a safe environment at all Jefferson County Junior Fair/4-H horse-related activities. It does not ensure safety, as horses are naturally an animal of flight. Please be aware there are inherent risks associated with all equine-related activities.)

- ☐ Participant can lead and stop the equine in a safe and correct manner.
- ☐ Participant is using tack that is safe and appropriate for the discipline.
- ☐ Participant can maintain control of equine while mounting and dismounting with the intent of the equine to stand for the process.
- ☐ Participant to demonstrate proper alignment in the saddle to ensure the rider is balanced in the seat.
- ☐ Participant to be able to use aids/ques for stop, turn and different gaits that apply to their project.
- ☐ Participant to know when and how to perform and emergency stop. (This is in case of accident or if a horse becomes loose.)
- ☐ Participant demonstrates an understanding of appropriate distance from other equine and bystanders.
- ☐ Equine shows no aggression; and the animal consistently demonstrates reactions that prove it can be used for a safe and positive end.

The AAHS (American Association Of Horsemanship Safety) has a book of recommendations for teaching safe horsemanship. These are a few of the skills or goals from the AAHS. Some of these skills may overlap or be touched on more than once.

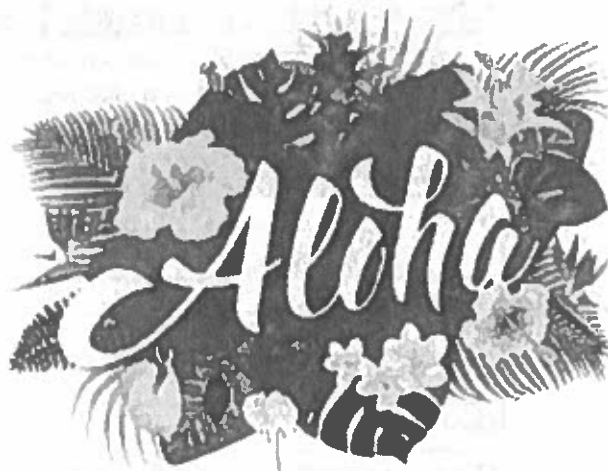

4-H Horse Leasing Guidelines

One purpose of 4-H horse projects is to teach young people how to feed, fit, show, and care for their animal(s). The more important purpose is to provide an opportunity for personal growth and development of the young person. Ohio 4-H realizes that some youth are unable to have an actual horse for their 4-H horse project. Options available to these individuals include:

- Lease a horse from another individual
- Horseless Horse Project (project number 173)

What Is The Purpose Of Leasing A Horse As A 4-H Project?

- A lease program is appropriate in the 4-H program when one or more of the following conditions exists:
 1. Youth does not have the financial ability to purchase a horse.
 2. Youth has a horse but it is unable to be used (lameness, pregnancy, too young, etc).
 3. Youth has a horse but it is the wrong type for the educational experience the youth wishes to obtain.

What Are Expectations Of The Horse Owner?

- An individual (lessor) who leases a horse must be willing to:
 1. Relinquish all rights to train, handle, and care for the horse in order for the youth to complete the requirements of a 4-H horse project. Potential owners should not lease horses they want to ride or show on a regular basis during the term of the lease.
 2. Not take the horse back prior to the end of the lease unless the youth agrees to return the horse.
 3. Have the youth (or parent/legal guardian) sign whatever agreements they decide upon in regard to care of the animal.
 4. Allow the youth to transport and show the horse in 4-H, open, or breed shows.

What Are Expectations Of The 4-H Participant?

- An individual (youth) who leases a horse as a 4-H project:
 1. To be responsible for the care of the animal in whatever manner is mutually agreeable to both the owner (lessor) and youth (lessee).
 2. To complete a horse identification form as required by local counties to identify the horse as a 4-H project.
 3. As a part of the educational experience of leasing a horse, to work in consultation with the owner (lessor) to develop a lease agreement on the horse selected for the Ohio 4-H program (see attached suggestions for developing a lease agreement).
 4. Prior to any deadline date established by your local County Extension Office, to submit to the local County Extension Office a completed copy of the horse identification form and lease agreement for verification purposes ONLY.

What Should Be Included In A Lease?

- Every lease is unique in the items that must be covered to protect both the owner (lessor) and the youth (lessee). A lease should be drawn and signed by the owner and the youth to insure adequate care of the animal, protect the investment of the lessor, and to detail the responsibility of the youth in regards to caring for the animal. It is wise to have a written lease agreement any time you are using someone else's horse, even if the owner is a family member. A lease can assist in preventing misunderstandings and unhappiness between the horse's owner and youth leasing the horse.
- We suggest the following issues, but not limited to these, be addressed in a lease:
 1. Identification of the horse (name, registration number if registered); the name, address, and phone number of the youth (lessee) leasing the horse; the name of parent/guardian if the youth is under 18 years of age; the name, address, and phone number of the owner (lessor).
 2. Who is responsible in case of injury or death to the horse. Who pays veterinarian bills, and what would be the maximum amount you are expected to pay in veterinarian costs if injury costs are your (lessee's) responsibility. In addition, if the animal is injured and unusable, who has to nurse the animal back to health? An owner (lessor) may require you to take out insurance on the horse with the owner as the beneficiary to cover possible loss due to the death of the horse.
 3. Where the horse will be housed and who is responsible for the daily care of the horse; any feed, health care (i.e. deworming, vaccinations, etc), foot care, and/or special stabling requirements made by the owner.
 4. The purpose(s) for which the horse will be used, and that it can be transported at the youth's discretion to shows.
 5. Any limitations that would be placed on the owner's use of the horse. Refer to the current Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows (Circular 179) for limitations caused by the animal being a 4-H project and include them or reference them in a statement, and make a copy of the rules available to the owner of the horse.
 6. A statement on the time period covered by the lease and under what conditions and time frame the lease can be discontinued.
 7. The owner should have a statement included relieving them of liability in cases of property damage, injury to the youth, or injury to a third party while the horse is under the lessee's supervision.
 8. A place for signatures for the owner (lessor) and the youth (lessee) with a line for parent/guardian if the youth is under 18 years of age.

The above mentioned issues are only suggestions, and we can not advise you as to specific terms or wording in a lease agreement. You may even want to consult an attorney.

Ohio 4-H Protective Headgear Rule

All youth age 19 and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM (American Society for Testing and Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute) standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine.

It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition. The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders are not responsible for checking headgear worn for such compliance.

The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders make no representation or warranty, expressed or implied, about any protective headgear, and cautions riders that death or serious injury may result despite wearing such headgear, as no helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries in equestrian activities.

The Ohio 4-H Horse Program, Show Committees, Officials, Extension Personnel and Volunteer Leaders may, at his/her discretion, check a participant's protective headgear for proper standards. If the youth is found to be wearing unapproved, defective, or improperly fitted headgear, he/she will not be permitted to participate in riding or driving activities until proper headgear is acquired.

Ohio 4-H Horse Program Protective Headgear Policy

Frequently Asked Questions*

1. Is protective headgear required to be worn at mounted meetings, trail rides, or other 4-H equestrian events?

Yes. Properly fitted ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear intended for equestrian use is required to be worn by all youth ages 19 and under while riding or driving an equine at any 4-H sponsored activity.

2. Many open horse shows that are NOT sponsored by 4-H have classes for 4-H members only. Are helmets required to be worn by 4-H members if they participate in such classes?

The Ohio 4-H Protective Headgear Rule is in effect for 4-H sponsored shows and activities only.

3. Does protective headgear have to be worn in showmanship classes?

No. Properly fitted ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear intended for equestrian use is required when a youth is riding or driving an equine during any 4-H activity, not when exhibiting an equine in-hand. However, the use of protective headgear intended for equestrian use is encouraged in all classes, and any exhibitor may wear protective headgear in any class without judging discrimination.

4. What style protective headgear should be used for western or driving classes?

Any style of ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear intended for equestrian use is allowed in western or driving classes, including western, english, or schooling helmets. It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, is in good condition, and is properly fitted with the chin harness fastened at all times while riding or driving.

5. Are helmets required when riding outside the show ring?

All youth age 19 and under, participating in any 4-H equestrian activity, are required to wear properly fitted ASTM/SEI helmet intended for equestrian use with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine anywhere on the competition grounds. Any exhibitor found in violation of this rule at any time will be prohibited from participating until proper safety headgear is in place.

6. Are bicycle or other helmets with a harness allowed?

No, bicycle helmets or hunt caps with a single chin strap are NOT acceptable. Only ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear intended for equestrian use is allowed.

7. May protective headgear be modified in any manner?

No, other than to adjust the fit with pads supplied by the manufacturer.

8. May helmet covers be used?

Covers may be used provided they can be removed for inspection of the helmet if necessary.

9. How should show committees or officials enforce the rule?

The Ohio 4-H protective headgear policy should be included in the show/event program or in the event rules. The show committee or officials are not required to inspect protective headgear *unless* the appropriateness of such headgear is questioned. In such cases, the show committee or officials have the authority to inspect the headgear and enforce the rule as stated in the current Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows (4-H 179). Any exhibitor found to be in violation of the rule will be prohibited from further participation until appropriate headgear is properly in place.

10. If it is *determined during a show class* that an exhibitor is using inappropriate headgear, how should the show committee or officials respond?

If the show committee or officials determine that the headgear is inappropriate and the exhibitor is in violation of the protective headgear rule, the exhibitor will be disqualified from that class. The exhibitor should be prohibited from further participation until appropriate headgear is properly in place.

11. How should a show committee or official respond if it is questioned that an exhibitor is riding with headgear that is not in compliance with current rules (i.e. currently riding in a class or riding on the show grounds)?

If it is brought to the show committee's or show official's attention that a youth's headgear is questionable, the show committee must immediately investigate and determine the accuracy of the report. If the headgear is not in compliance with the protective headgear rule, the show committee or official must prohibit the exhibitor from further riding/driving until properly fitted ASTM/SEI approved headgear is in place. The show committee or officials may investigate the appropriateness of headgear without a formal protest.

13. Should counties or 4-H clubs buy helmets for use by 4-H members at 4-H sponsored events?

No. Protective headgear should only be purchased or owned by the 4-H member or their parent(s) or guardian(s). It is the responsibility of the rider, or the parent or guardian of the youth participant, to make sure that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear intended for equestrian use, and is properly fitted and in good condition.
