

Jefferson County Fair Honors Veterans, Sets Livestock Sale Record!

The 152nd Jefferson County Fair theme, "Respecting Our Roots, Planting For Our Future," honored the history of the fair, while paying tribute to its past, current and future supporters. Fairboard President Ray Hilderbrand opened the fair by honoring armed services veterans, who also served as the grand marshals of the fair's parade.

"These veterans maintain a very nice memorial display here on our fairgrounds," he said. "It is only right that we honor their service and thank them for providing a place here where all service men and women can feel appreciated." Hilderbrand said in addition to honoring the veterans, the junior fair sale was another highlight of the fair.

"Overall, the junior fair livestock sale broke the record at more than \$496,000," he said. "These kids exhibit here because they love doing it; and they are in the show ring representing their families. Some of them come from many generations of exhibitors at this fair.

The 2023 Jefferson County Junior Fair market livestock sale total exceeded the 2022 record by more than \$30,000.

"These kids are the future pillars of this community," Hilderbrand said. "We are grateful to the buyers who come out to invest in them and their projects. Those buyers are investing in the future of this community by showing up here. The buyers and kids set a few new records; and there was even a heartfelt donation to the Zane Carson memorial scholarship fund. Cole Saiter of the Friends & Neighbors 4-H Club sold his market lamb sold for \$23 per pound and donated all the proceeds in the memory of his friend! These junior fair youth, they understand the meaning of community."

Updated 2024 4-H Code of Conduct

CFAES

COLLEGE of FOOD, AGRICULTURAL, and ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES



OHIO 4-H CODE OF CONDUCT

4-H members, parents, and other adults participating in 4-H activities will:

- Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies, and rules of the facility being used.
- Conduct themselves in a courteous, ethical, respectful manner, use appropriate language (including not using profanity), exhibit good sportsmanship, and provide positive role models.
- Abstain from illegal behaviors, use of alcohol, illegal or illicit drugs, tobacco in any form, and/or any vaping products during 4-H events and activities.
- Fully participate in scheduled activities.
- 5. Respect other's property and privacy rights.
- Abstain from child abuse (physical and/or verbal) harassment, and actions that bully, ridicule, dominate, or display inappropriate behavior toward others.
- Accept personal responsibility for behavior, destruction or theft of property including any financial damage.
- Be responsible for any financial damage caused by inappropriate behavior.
- Adhere to rules of safety.
- Follow Ohio and county laws and regulations related to the care, handling, and possession of animals and living creatures.
- 11. Operate machinery, vehicles, and any other required equipment in a responsible manner in accordance with the directives of OSU Extension personnel and Ohio and county laws and regulations.
- 12. I will uphold and support the responsible and lawful use of social media. In so doing, I will not create or post social media content that is abusive, threatening, defamatory, obscene, harassing, or creates a hostile environment.
- Follow the Ohio State University Standards of Behavior for Minor Participants Participating in Activities and Programs with Minor Participants.

As a program participant in OSU Extension, 4-H participants must practice good citizenship, leadership and self-control and not engage in discriminatory behavior, which includes harassment, discrimination, sexual misconduct, and retaliation.

This means you should not exclude anyone from participating in any program or activity, or discriminate against them because of their identity.

Identity includes: age, ancestry, color, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity or expression, genetic information, HIV/AIDS status, military status, national origin, pregnancy, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or protected veteran status.

Consequences for violating any part of this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to: removal from the 4-H program; removal from participation in the event in which the code of conduct has been violated (at the individual's expense); forfeiture of financial support; sanctions on or being banned from participating in future 4-H events; removal from leadership positions and/or offices held, etc. When warranted (e.g., violation of law) the situation may be turned over to the appropriate law enforcement authority.



GLEDN is an invasive species early detection and warning system for the Great Lakes region developed through funding provided by the National Park Service as part of the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative.

GLEDN is an online system that collects invasive species reports from casual observers, verifies these reports and integrates them with others networks. The system then uses this integrated information to send customized early detection email alerts. Visit apps.bugwood.org to learn more.

The gateway to state and national 4-H opportunities, trips, and experiences!

The Ohio 4-H Achievement Record is a comprehensive record of a 4-H member's career, accomplishments, and achievements. It is a great way to capture all the experiences they have had in 4-H, practice for filling out future job or college applications, and get a head start on applying for scholarships.

There are 27 project area categories in which to apply, such as individual animal projects, citizenship, community service, clothing, creative arts, woodworking, shooting sports, leadership, and more! 4-H members can submit multiple achievement records in different categories based on their 4-H involvement. State winners in each category win a trip to events such as National 4-H Congress, National Dairy Conference and the Shooting Sports Teen Leadership Institute. These events encourage members to expand their skills, engage with other 4-H members, and inspire them to make an impact in their communities!

How do I get started?

Start by filling out the Achievement Record. The Ohio 4-H Achievement record can be found at ohio4h.org/awardsandscholarships. Sections include 4-H project work, 4-H participation, major 4-H honors, 4-H community service and citizenship activities, 4-H educational leadership, office and committee leadership, and non-4-H experiences, in addition to a written 4-H story and photo page reflecting on the member's 4-H experiences and impact.



1. Contact your county office

Contact your county 4-H professional for information about county deadlines, review process, and what local opportunities may be available through completing the achievement record!



2. Complete the Achievement Record

Complete all sections of the achievement record form. Be sure to follow the guidelines and show a cumulative record of your 4-H career! Applications can be tailored to the project area you are applying for.



3. Submit to your county office

Submit to your county 4-H professional by the deadline. State selections are made in February and state winners are notified in the spring.

So you want to be MO4-H'er 2023... here is what you need to know!

There are two categories.

These are based on age in 4-H years, or as of Jan. 1:
 Junior (ages 9 – 13)
 Senior (ages 14-18)

- <u>By 4 pm, Sept. 15, you must turn in an updated achievement form complete with your 2023 accomplishments and an essay to the OSU Extension office</u>. Both documents must be hand delivered or postmarked USPS mail on or before Sept. 15. <u>No emailed or faxed forms will be accepted.</u>
- You can download a 2023 Ohio 4-H Achievement Record from https://ohio4h.org/awardsandscholarships. Fill out the form in detail. It must be typed. Go back at least three years while inputting information.
- Type a one-page, double -spaced essay answering the question, "Why I should be named the 2023 Most Outstanding 4-H'er."

The 4-H member must have:

- Have already participated in a 2023 judged competition in-person at either Contest Day or Project Judging Day.
- Have already completed the previous year in 4-H having been named a gold member.
- Agree to attend and participate in an interview the evening of Oct. 2 at the OSU Extension Office, 500 Market Street, Suite 512, Steubenville. Interview times will be assigned the week of Sept 20. No interview will start before 4:30 pm. All interviews must be in person and on the date scheduled.
- Attend the 4-H annual meeting and banquet at 6 pm, Oct. 9, at Wintersville Fire Hall with Undo's catering to be recognized for your effort. Award winners will be announced at this event. All participants will be recognized.




